

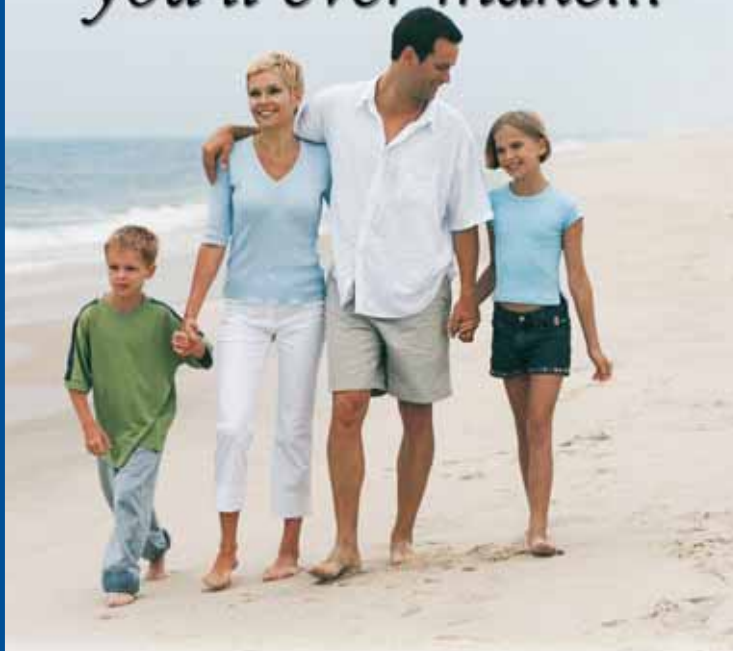

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TV Crew In Town

A cable television network started by Oprah Winfrey was in Seabrook recently shooting a television movie about the Pamela Smart case. A film crew crisscrossed the state in December collecting footage, and Oxygen Network is expected to air the episode this spring. Smart is serving a life sentence without parole for masterminding the 1991 murder of her husband, Greg Smart, by her teenage lover, a Seabrook native. The highly publicized case will be featured on a half-hour docudrama as part of a series tracking the lives of female felons who kill their men, according to Oxygen website www.tvtoome.com.

The Smart case is currently under appeal to overturn the conviction.

Officials Want Courthouse

Seabrook officials want the new district courthouse built in town. Seabrook Town Manager Fred Welch recently suggested that in March, town voters should approve an effort to build the new district courthouse on town land off Route 107. In a December 15 memo to selectmen, Republican lawmaker Frank Palazzo of Seabrook said that State Supreme Court officials had no idea that Seabrook had long offered to let the state build the new courthouse on donated land. Seabrook is competing with Hampton, which wants to keep the courthouse in that town.

president's message



As we begin our 8th year as a civic organization, I am reflecting on the many changes that have evolved in our little community. When Tom and I first moved here in October 1969, there were only a handful of homes lit up during the winter months. This year during the holidays, it was amazing to see the number of homes decorated and displaying holiday lights. It is comforting to have neighbors here year-round, especially during a snowstorm when everyone is out shoveling or walking. For those of you who are away this winter, the face of the beach continues to change. There are at least sixteen remodels or new homes now under construction. So progress continues, but here is a look back in our history:

The first issue of our newsletter titled SEABROOK BEACH SHORE NEWS was published in the winter of 1998. It stated that the first meeting of the SBCA was held in August of 1997, and was “established to promote betterment issues that will enhance the livability of Seabrook Beach.” The Officers were President, Paul Lemoine; Vice President Don Walker; Secretary, Suzanne Manzi and Treasurer, Gerry Rogers. Standing Committee Chairs were George Ziady, By-laws; Jacqui Lewis, Publicity and Newsletter; Frank Leone, Safety; and Debbie Carroll, Telephone Network. We reported the untimely death of charter member Joyce Cargill on January 24; her original ideas for a sign and suitable plantings to improve the corner of Hooksett St. were in the planning stage. Under consideration was the improvement of the island at Rte. 286, and the pursuit of donations for park benches to be located at each of the beach’s public access paths.

Certainly our goals were met and we have moved on and accomplished many endeavors in accordance with our mission statement. Beautification projects progressed with the plantings and benches at the public rest-room area and parking lot fronting the Harbor. The SBCA also placed two more signs welcoming residents and visitors to Seabrook Beach and Harbor, and the display of wildflowers at the Rt. 286 corner continues to delight with new species each year. Our meetings have also evolved, and we provide diverse and interesting guest speakers each month to inform our membership of current civic issues. Over the years we have established some traditions such as the Yard Sale fundraiser, the Adopt-A-Highway Cleanup, the Annual Sand Sculpture Contest, a family event, and the Fireworks Cruise, a fun social event. With your help, we’ll be continuing these traditions and perhaps adding a few more.

We have grown from publishing a 3-page hand-typed newsletter to a slick presentation funded by advertisers interested in contributing to our community interests. We now have a website: www.seabrookbeachcivicasoc.org to keep you informed. Our membership continues to grow and our Board of Directors now includes a Data Administrator and a Web Master to handle these expansions.

As I enter this fifth and final year as President of the SBCA, I look forward to completing the beautification of the River St. corner, which has been in the planning stages for a while. The State will be replacing the traffic lights at the corner this spring, at which time we hope to plant the area. As the Directors have always done a superb job in guiding this association to its current standards, we look to our membership to provide new ideas of ways to “better our livability” in our community. We also welcome your participation and volunteer time to help us pave the way for the future.

Key Warrant Articles

Here are a few of the most important issues, especially as they relate to the beach. Each article will have the impact value on our tax rate of \$1.00 per thousand, bringing the town portion to \$6.00.

The operating budget has gone up 12.7%. Of that, 10% is contractual or related to maintenance of certain funds. The budget to be brought before the voters is \$14,771,360.00 with an impact of \$6.3075. If this does not pass, the default budget will be set at approximately \$14,413,827.00. If the budget passes, we will be looking at approximately \$15.25 and up to \$16.00 per thousand if all warrant articles pass. (This is highly unlikely.) An exact figure cannot be given because we have no figures to the county, statewide property tax and school budgets.

It should be noted that included in the operating budget with the DPW is the beach rake.

There are 26 money articles this year. I'll list a few but as usual I encourage all voters to read each carefully and prioritize.

The DPW is in dire need of equipment due to failure to have previous warrant articles passed. For instance, the backhoe that is used for beach maintenance in Article 28 is \$80,000.00 with an impact of \$0.471.

The beach maintenance plan is Article 32 for \$50,000.00 with an impact of \$0.0294. This is for long term maintenance of the beach. The Beach Maintenance Committee should be commended for their time and dedication to this proposal.

The Fire Department's Article 15 calls for a new ambulance for \$150,000.00 with monies being used from the expended fund; the impact is \$0.0294. This is especially needed for the summer calls. The Fire Dept. is also asking for a new Fire Engine / Pumper for \$100,000.00; part of this money will come from the unexpended fund and some from the trade in of the old 1983 engine. There is no impact.

Article 21 is for the Seabrook Employees' Union. This is a one-year contract with no retro. These are our employees for all the departments and they have been without a raise since December of 2000. The impact would be \$0.0294. YOUR SUPPORT IS NEEDED!!

Article 19 is the painting of the water towers for \$240,000.00, with \$100,000.00 from unexpended funds, so the impact will be \$0.0823. This is a must. The insides of the towers have sheets of paint literally floating in our water supply!

Article 35 targets the Water and Sewer Department and is EPA mandated. There is need for a high-pressure water-jetting unit at a cost of \$54,000.00 with an impact of 0.0318. The town narrowly escaped being fined a hefty amount and MUST follow the EPA mandates or possibly face fines in the range of \$1,000,000.00. This article MUST be passed.

All articles may be posted on the town's web site (www.seabrooknh.org), but will definitely be available at the town hall and in the town report for review and consideration.

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The Project at Seabrook Harbor

The Corps of Engineers have developed and funded the restoration project at Seabrook Harbor. The area that has become known as the River Street Cut is under construction; two retaining walls will block the present flow of water and the erosion of the shoreline. One wall is positioned at the west end of the cut to redirect the flow of the Blackwater River to its original route. The wall at the east end near the harbor will allow the middle ground of clam flats to redevelop. Dredging of sand from the Blackwater River will be used to fill the area between the two walls to recreate the middle ground area and allow the flow of the river to run on the backside of the harbor before exiting under the Rte.1A bridge.

Once this dredging project is completed, both Seabrook and Hampton Harbors will be dredged to maintain the navigable areas used by local fishing and recreation boats.

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Reducing your Pet's Ecological Paw Print

Picking up pet poop is more than just being courteous to your neighbors. The practice keeps feces from polluting local waterways.

More than 140 million dogs and cats share a cherished spot in American households; here's how to make our pets more environmentally friendly.

Today, many Americans are aware of the heavy ecological footprint they leave behind, but few may stop to ponder the ecological paw print of their pets. "Animals can't do anything about it," says Patricia Conrad, a wildlife parasitologist at the University of California-Davis, "but people can."

Studying sea otter deaths along the central state coast, Conrad says, "The biggest culprit appears to be toxoplasmosis, caused by a protozoa found in the feces of the domestic cat.

The parasite, which infects cats that eat birds or rodents, reaches waterways in storm runoff, and filter feeders such as shellfish ingest it.

The easy solution is to have people keep their cats indoors so that they don't defecate outside, and bag their kitty litter instead of flushing it down the toilet. Because the parasites are hearty, chlorine used to treat water at sewage plants may not kill them all. Keeping a cat inside your house can likewise prevent the killing of songbirds – another way your pet can adversely affect the natural environment.

You can also use an eco-friendly cat litter. Not so long ago, the only cat litter around was clay – which is strip-mined and laden with silica dust, a known human carcinogen, according to the International Agency for Research and Cancer. But today, choices abound. Some litter is made from post-consumer recycled material such as newspaper. Others are made from sawmill scrap or plants such as wheat, corn or kenaf. If it's biogradable, it's better for the environment. That's especially true given that an estimated 2 million tons of nonbiogradable cat litter ends up in U.S. landfills each year.

When it comes to water pollution, dogs also pose a problem. According to a 1999 Vanderbilt University study, dog feces are a major cause of water pollution in urban and suburban areas, particularly following periods of heavy rain. The runoff taints streams and rivers, robbing them of oxygen and killing aquatic life.

Animal wastes deposited on hard, flat surfaces such as streets, parking lots and lawns are less likely to decompose and much more likely to get washed into drains and ditches that flow into local waterways.

Ensure that your pet has a positive effect on the natural environment: bag your cat's litter and scoop your dog's poop.

- If your score is between 20 and 29, you're using too much water for your actual needs, which makes you, unfortunately, a normal water user! Try cutting back on the number of loads of wash per week (do full loads instead of partial loads) and on the length of time you shower; save dishes for one big wash per day in your dishwasher, or, if you wash by hand, do so in a basin, and turn on the tap only for rinsing; cut down on lawn and garden watering.
- If your total is 30 or more, you're a water waster. Put a plug in it!

Clear a Path to Your Meters

Snowdrifts can make it difficult for meter readers to access your meters. Clearing a path to the meters helps them do their job and helps you, as well. During their monthly rounds, meter readers make sure your meters are functioning properly and haven't been damaged by the snow and ice of winter storms. Accurate meters mean accurate readings, and that means accurate billing, a benefit to you.

Former State Rep. McCann to Run Against Knowles

In March, former State Rep. Richard McCann, 63, will be the sole candidate to challenge veteran town official Asa Knowles, Jr., for a seat on the Board of Selectmen.

"My main reason for running is that Seabrook has become a big town, with a big budget," said McCann. "In my estimation, good business management is needed in order to run the town efficiently, effectively and in the most cost-wise manner."

McCann is a relative newcomer to town, having moved to Seabrook five years ago. He served in the Statehouse representing District 14 along with three other Republicans from Seabrook. As State Representative, McCann helped obtain the release of \$1 million in state funding for the dredging of Seabrook Harbor. He chose not to seek re-election last November.

McCann is a retired school administrator, having worked for 25 years as assistant superintendent for business in Nashua, and as a deputy superintendent in California. He works occasionally as a school consultant.

The Nashua native is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and received his MBA from Rivier College in Nashua.
